





#### **ASSIGNMENT**



Students read chapter 3 of Brophy's University, Court, and Slave (2016).

Students assigned a slave record contained in UA ACUMEN.

- Explain WHO/WHAT/WHEN,
- Contextualize document with Brophy reading and lecture,
- Suggest how UA can better commemorate the enslaved individual(s) in the text.

#### **SUGGESTIONS FOR UA**

56 out of 57 students felt that the University could do more to better commemorate/promote the history of slavery and the lives of the enslaved people on campus. Their suggestions, ranked in order, are as follows:

- Tell the story (update current tour; incorporate it during Bama Bound, and/or add required course in the curriculum).
- Add new monuments, markers, museum, etc. to the commemorative landscape and place in centralized locales if not the Quad.
- Rename buildings after enslaved people and/or African American pioneers (students, faculty, staff, and administration).
- Encourage fundraising campaigns (buy a brick in honor of enslaved individuals, scholarships, etc.)

#### STUDENTS' COMMITMENTS


For this assignment, students had the opportunity to obtain extra-credit for providing how they would personally commemorate the enslaved person(s) mentioned in their respective document.

Their responses appear in the following slides.

Note: These are the words of the students without any editing on my part. Any grammatical errors reflects nothing more than inadequate proofreading and haste. I have removed their names.

#### UNKNOWN, 1838

"Personally, I plan to remember this individual by keeping him in mind every time I think about quitting or slacking in aspects of my life. To me, it is important to honor these individuals by doing our very best in life and honoring everything that they have done for our culture."



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
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"I personally plan on remembering this particular slave off the fact that the receipt is date around the time of Thanksgiving. This is a day that was so giving to the particular person. While families enjoy one another, I will definitely remember those who couldn't."

#### RICHARD, 1838

"I personally plan to remember the individuals highlighted in my assignment by looking at myself as a black man trying to honor those that paved the way to my freedom. Each is a day that we evolve in our individual biases. Therefore, I will strive to keep mine in perspective and treat people the way I would want to be treated. My ancestors were not treated humane in the practice and acceptance of slavery. So in honoring and remembering Richard the slave in my assignment, and others like him, I will live each day trying not to take my life and freedom for granted."



#### **CESAR**, 1839

"I believe that they should make an exhibit dedicated to the men, women, and children who built this University ground up. I think it should be filled with many of the artifacts that are saved. That includes documents, pictures, clothing, or anything from that time. I think that the University should dedicate and entire month (NOT black history month) to recognize the people who dedicated their lives to the University. I also feel as if the University should tell the truth when they are doing tours about the campus. We need plagues at the school of all of the names of the individuals who built this University. Last but not least we need some buildings names after the ones who were vital to this University."



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

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
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"I think the most they can do to honor slaves is to acknowledge the impact they had on this campus and the work they did for this campus."





"I plan to remember Willis when sitting in the classes. I plan to admire the hard work of my ancestors and remember how much was endured for me to sit in this seat today."


"In order to honor the slave mentioned in my assigned document, the University of Alabama could rename buildings named after people with ties to slavery and racism. This act will let people know that the University of Alabama does not celebrate its dark past. It would also show that the University is sensitive to it's black and minority students, and that they are welcomed as well. The University could also establish a memorial on the quad for all the slaves that lost their lives and are buried on the campus. This act forces people to face the fact that slavery existed here, and that it is not something to be hidden, but something to learn from."

Manly, hardly any information on Eliza Perkins, and unfortunately, absolutely no information on the slave. I could hardly distinguish the letters in his name on the receipt. 
# **MOSES, 1846**






#### WILLIAM, 1842

the 19th of March and the thirty-first I July 1849.—


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

## **PETER, 1842**






#### **WILLIAM AND EDWARD, 1846**








## **WILLIS, 1846**



# UNKNOWN, 1858





Arthur and other slaves helped create the first establishments on campus and was directly responsible for their maintenance, their existence today. Without their hands, the foundation of this campus loses the richness to its history. Their quarters may be removed from the blueprint of a specific time but not the blueprint of history."









I will be sure to share my invoice written for Moses, Arthur, and [Sam]."

#### UNKNOWN, 1841



"After reading my document as well as hearing the lectures in class, I began to think of ways I could remember the names of those who helped build this campus. Although it seems small and insignificant I try to say thank you to all the bus drivers when I reach my stop, make a conscious effort to clean up after myself in the dining hall, these employees are not my parents and are not here to clean up after me. I also speak to them with respect and gratitude when receiving my food or placing my order. They are people too and deserve to be treated as such. So many people working on this campus who are older were denied acceptance here and many other schools, I feel like the least I can do is be appreciative and respectful to them. It really aggravates me when I see people of any race treating staff as their servants. It's like I'm witnessing what happened to my ancestors right in front of me."
